## **INTRO IDEAS**

You may want to open discussion with ... what is architecture?, what are some types of architecture? Then give some history and characteristics of Greek and Roman (these types are known as "Classic") architecture.

Then you can compare the Roman Colosseum to the U.S. Capitol building. The U.S. Capitol is Neo-Classic, or styled after Classic architecture.

It may be interesting to talk about why these were good designs when considering the use of these buildings. What does an architect need to consider when designing a building? Location, weather, materials, function, aesthetics.
